
How a Speaker Works

Have you ever wondered how a speaker generates sound? A speaker works a bit like an air pump. When the cone of the speaker moves, it moves the air that surrounds it. This air in turn moves more air, creating a vibration that we interpret as sound. The speed at which the cone vibrates, combined with the distance it moves, helps to vary the sounds that we hear.

Inside the speaker is the voice coil. The voice coil consists of a metal (usually iron) core that has been wrapped in a metal wire. When an electric current passes through the wire, the core is magnetised and the voice coil becomes an 'electromagnet'. Depending on the direction of the current, this electromagnet is either attracted towards or repelled from the large fixed magnet. This alternating attraction and repulsion makes the voice coil vibrate, which in turn vibrates the cone. The spider and suspension, the two other moving parts of the speaker, work together to return the voice coil to position.

The cone's shape helps to amplify the sound in the same way that speaking into a coneshaped newspaper makes your voice louder. A larger cone will displace more air, creating a louder sound. This is why many music concerts feature very large speakers. Headphones contain tiny speakers, as do phones and computers. Whenever you listen to sounds through an electronic device you will be experiencing electromagnetism at work.



Ready for Veggie

Amrita's blog



I have always been aware that there are a lot of vegetarians in the world but, being an avid burger fan, I had never thought about becoming a 'veggie'. Recently, however, a number of my friends have been posting about the issue on their social media sites, and it got me thinking ... Could I really give up meat? While some of the arguments they presented (such as 'eating meat is cruel') didn't manage to persuade me, two of them got my attention: a vegetarian diet is healthier, and it is also better for the environment. So, I decided to investigate further.

A vegetarian diet, it turns out, may make you live longer. Studies in different countries (China and the US for instance) support these findings. Meat is the largest source of saturated fat in the human diet and saturated fat is pretty bad. It is thought to cause heart disease and has even been linked to some forms of cancer. A vegetarian diet pretty much ensures that you are eating the required amount of vegetables, and this means your body will be getting enough fibre and other nutrients such as vitamins and minerals.

The claim that vegetarianism is better for the environment is a more compelling yet complex argument. Farm animals release a lot of methane – a gas that is produced in the gut. Methane causes much more global warming than carbon dioxide. Reducing the number of farmed animals in the world reduces the amount of methane entering the Earth's atmosphere, and this could help slow down the problems associated with climate change.

For this reason I have decided to cut back on the amount of meat that I eat, limiting myself to just three meat meals each week. I'm not ready to turn fully vegetarian just yet — I like the taste of burgers just a little too much — but maybe one day I'll be joining my friends online, trying to persuade others to give up meat.

Jellyfish


Jellyfish are not fish. They do not have bones like real fish. They also have no heart, no blood and, rather amazingly, they do not have a brain. Yet these creatures have been able to survive in our oceans for 650 million years.

There are about 1,500 different species of jellyfish and scientists are discovering more each year. But the scientists need to be careful because all jellyfish are poisonous. Their tentacles (the long string-like parts which hang from their bodies) contain thousands of tiny, sharp barbs that can inject venom into the creatures they come into contact with. Sometimes this venom is used for self-defence, and sometimes it is used to stun or kill prey.


Not all jellyfish can hurt humans (many are just too small), but the box jellyfish is one species that is deadly. Just one sting from one of its three-metre long tentacles can kill a human in minutes. In fact, the box jellyfish has enough poison in its body to kill 60 humans at once. Unlike most jellyfish that simply float, the box jellyfish is able to propel itself through the ocean by pushing jets of water through its body, using its 24 eyes to locate its prey.


Despite having such dangerous stings, jellyfish are eaten by other animals. Having no shell or bones, a jellyfish is an easy meal for a shark. Sea turtles will also eat jellyfish, even box jellyfish, as they are not affected by their stings. Some species of small fish are also not affected by the poison and they use the jellyfish tentacles as a shield from predators.

Incredibly, one species of jellyfish may be able to live forever. When the *turritopsis dohrnii* feels threatened, is injured or starving, it can revert back to its early life stage and begin growing again. Most jellyfish, however, will live for less than one year and some of the smallest jellyfish may only survive for just a few days.


